KNOW YOUR TEXAS VOTER RIGHTS 2022



Our Vote Texas is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit and does not work on behalf of any political party, candidate or elected official. Voters can use 1 of 7 forms of photo ID: With exception of citizenship certificate, IDs may be expired up to four years.

- Driver license
- Texas Election Identification Certificate (EIC)
- Texas Personal Identification Card issued by DPS
- Texas license to carry a handgun issued by DPS
- US military identification card with your picture
- US citizenship certificate with your picture
- US passport

Things To Know:

- Election officials can't question a voter about the use of an ID type.
- Poll watchers can't question a voter about voter ID issues.
- The ID address doesn't have to match the voter registration address. There is currently no address matching requirement.

Don't Have An ID Listed On The Left? Here Are Other Acceptable Documents You Can Present:

- Valid voter registration certificate (card)
- Certified birth certificate
- Current utility bill
- Bank statement
- Government check
- Paycheck
- Any other government document with the individual's name and address

With A Document From The Above List You'll Be Asked To Sign A Reasonable Impediment Declaration. Talk To An Election Worker To Receive One.

You Have The Right To:

- A ballot with written instructions on how to cast a ballot.
- Ask the polling place official for instructions on how to cast a ballot (no suggestions on how to vote).
- Receive up to two more ballots if you make a mistake on yours.
- If you can't write, see the ballot, or understand the language it's written in, you are able to ask for help in casting your ballot.
- Vote in secret and free from intimidation.
- Bring an interpreter to assist you as you qualify to vote if you do not understand the English language.
- Vote once at any early voting location during the early voting period.
- Report any voting rights abuse you see or experience.
